AN UP-DATE FROM TOKERAU

I cam across an article for Advent that I hope encourages you as it has me.

Anticipating the Advent By Lance Moore

Anticipation should be a joyful feeling, not the feeling of anxiety and dread. But the feelings are similar in that whatever we expect, whether good or bad, is often surprising.

One of my favourite jokes illustrates the connection between anticipation and surprise. Back in the wild West, a stranger stands at a saloon bar. Suddenly a cowboy runs in screaming, "Hey, everybody, Big Bad John is coming to town." Several others exclaim: "Big Bad John is the meanest, toughest, biggest outlaw in the West. Let's run for it." Everyone heads for the door except the stranger and the bartender. The bartender says, "Are you deaf, mister? Big Bad John is coming!" The stranger replies, "I don't know who he is, but he can't be all that big and bad. I'm not afraid." So, the stranger and the bartender wait. Soon the saloon doors fly off their hinges, and a mountain of a man stomps through the door. Covered with scars and sporting a scowl, he demands a drink. The bartender meekly complies. The stranger nervously thinks to himself, "Now I wish I had run away; this guy is the biggest, meanest-looking outlaw I've ever seen." The outlaw downs the drink in one gulp, slams it down on the bar, then turns and looks the stranger coldly in the eye to announce, "I don't know about you, stranger, but I'm gettin' outta here. I don't wanna be here when Big Bad John comes in!"

Anticipation is usually followed with surprise! Most jokes have that same structure: anticipation, then surprise. We know something is coming but then it was not what we expected. There is something delightful about the formula. Children know it. That's why they love opening Christmas presents. They must look at those wrapped gifts for weeks of suspense, and only on Christmas morning do they receive the surprise.

If only we adults could reclaim some of the anticipation and surprise, the excitement and wonder, of a child's Christmas . . . or of the very first Christmas. Admittedly, we know what is coming. We feel no anticipation about the coming of Christ; Christmas for some people is just another holiday, that same old time of year where we fight our way through stores, unpack our ornaments, and eat too much.

We must work at it if we wish to reclaim the excitement of Advent. Paradoxically, one must prepare to be surprised. Pause for a moment and consider the hope, anticipation, and surprise of that first Christmas. So I'm asking you in this Advent season to shift your perspective.

Don't view Christmas as a mundane or repetitious holiday. Don't expect the "same old, same old." Don't rule out the miraculous and the startling; prepare your mind for the serendipitous joy of new insights, liberation, and the fulfilment of hope. Prepare to be surprised.

KAREL LORIER'S REFLECTIONS Jesus' birth stories

My computer tells me this is the hundredth article for the Newsletter. In the first article I wrote: "If you call yourself a Christian or a religious person today, people automatically assume that you are a fundamentalist of some sort.

This is largely because fundamentalist forms of religion are hogging the headlines. All this has had an impact on how we feel about ourselves as Christian people. The questions raised by this changing world challenge our Christian faith. For some the questions have been such that they have found themselves saying "no" to Christianity. For me the opposite has occurred.

After some years of study examining Christianity from several perspectives, I am more convinced than ever of the importance of Jesus to our world... I am excited by what I have discovered. I hope that you may find some of the things I write helpful."

This is the time of year when the birth stories of Jesus are told.

They are not historic factual accounts, although they have been used to create theological castles in the air.

If you read the two birth stories, the first one in Matthew and second in Luke you will see they are two mutually exclusive stories.

They are rich in symbolic meanings which would have leapt out to their original intended audiences but, unless we study them very carefully in their context, we miss.

Matthew's story of Jesus birth starts with a genealogy in which four women are named, Tamar, who posed as a prostitute and has a child by her father-in-law Judah, Rahab the Canaanite prostitute who welcomed the Hebrew spies in Jericho, Ruth who was a Moabite gentile who seduced Boaz, and Bathsheba, who is not actually named but is called Uriah's wife and by whom King David has a son, Solomon. What is Matthew trying to tell us?

Jesus is born in Bethlehem where Mary and Joseph live. She is pregnant by the Holy Spirit. Joseph to whom she is betrothed, marries her. Jesus is born and is then visited by the wisemen (astronomers, the scientists of their time) who are led by a special star. On their way they advised King Herod who is not pleased. Joseph is warned in a dream to leave and he takes Mary and Jesus to Egypt. Jealous Herod kills all the two-year old and younger boys. After staying in Egypt until Herod dies, Joseph and family return to settle in Nazareth. (Read Matthew 1:1-2:23)

Matthew tackles several things, especially the questions about Jesus' birth. He was known as son of Mary (rather than Son of Joseph) - an insult at the time - used to undermine the authority of his teaching. It was believed the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem. Jesus is taken to Egypt and the young boys two and under are killed, as in the story of Pharaoh and Moses. Matthew wants to portray Jesus as a new Moses for his Jewish readers.

Luke's story is preceded by the birth of his cousin John the Baptist. John is shown as secondary to Jesus. Jesus having been John's disciple was an embarrassment to the early church.

Luke dates the birth of Jesus from when Augustus was emperor and makes the Quirinius Census the occasion for Mary and Joseph to travel from Nazareth to Bethlehem. Mary is promised in marriage to Joseph. She is pregnant. Jesus is born and is laid in a manger. There is no room at the inn. The Quirinius census did not take place in fact until Jesus

was between 10 and 12 years

old.

There are shepherds in fields nearby. An angel of the Lord appears to them telling them the good news that a saviour is born - Christ the Lord. A great army of angels sing "Glory to God in the highest heaven and peace on earth to those with



whom he is pleased." The shepherds visit Jesus and tell what happened. A week later Jesus is circumcised. Then Mary and Joseph travel to Jerusalem for the ritual of purification and the presentation of Jesus to the Lord (required by religious law for every first born). Jesus is greeted by two God fearing people Simeon and a prophet, Anna. As a twelve-year-old Jesus debates with the Jewish teachers.

(Read Luke 1-2:52)

Luke wants to show Jesus identifying with the poor - the shepherds - and the devout. The religious law is followed. He is born in Bethlehem of David's line. As he was known as Jesus of Nazareth, this is where he was most likely born. Luke by including the story of Jesus at twelve in the temple debating with the Jewish teachers follows the usual Greek-Roman form of writing about a famous person - showing that in their youth they already showed the promise of what flowered in adulthood.

Both these stories are the ancient form of introducing a most important person such as an emperor. They are not meant to be factual history in the way we understand it.

Should we abandon these stories, because they are not factually true? No, they are a rich part of our heritage. But we should speak of them for what they are. Not factual history, but myth. Told in an age when they indicated as vehemently as possible that Jesus and what he taught was and is of paramount importance. Listen to him.

UPDATE FROM PARISH COUNCIL

At the November meeting of Parish Council time was spent considering the paper "A Case for Change" which has been produced by a Northern Presbytery Task Group led by Dr Rod Watts who is the Executive Officer of the Presbytery. Ian Watson from our parish was a member of the Task Group. The paper identifies the decline in the Presbyterian Church and spells out the options of: Manage the decline; or Change. The next task of the Group is to develop a Strategic Plan.

Against this background the conference being organised here in the Northern Presbytery "Our God is Able" for 22 February is seen as being particularly important. Our parish will look to send a representative group to the conference and we would welcome any members of the congregation who are interested in attending. We will be arranging a pre conference meeting earlier in February of those who are interested in participating to discuss our focus.


