#### **AN UP-DATE FROM TOKERAU**

#### Kia orana and greetings.

The following is an article about prayer I found very inspiring. I want to share it with you with the hope you will be encouraged to continue praying for our ministry together.

#### "Crazy ideas change the world" by David Staal

The Bible contains story after story that began with ideas that likely seemed far -fetched. Fight the giant warrior with just a sling? Leave the family fishing business? Gather together in Jerusalem and simply wait—for what? Fortunately, the people in those stories had just enough faith in God to take crazy ideas seriously.

A couple decades ago, someone shared a wild option for our organization to consider. We do just one thing: we partner local churches with local schools and equip the churches to mentor at-risk students at the schools. One mentor with one child. Simple. The new idea: Add a prayer partner to each relationship, someone willing to feel a burden and pray behind-the-scenes specifically and consistently for the student, the mentor, and their relationship. In other words, ask churches to recruit two people for every one student. In a single word: Crazy. Finding one volunteer is hard enough. I'm so glad we went with the far-fetched idea.

Twenty years later, data arrived that demonstrates the value of this "different" approach. Specifically, evidence that points to passionate, specific, persistent prayers as delivering something amazing. Yes, I realize that this should not be new news. But before you suddenly stop reading this column, please answer this: Do you have well-researched data that shows prayer works? I do. And it's crazy-exciting.

A two-year evaluation of our program by a highly-credible, external researcher showed that the existence of a highly engaged prayer partner serves as the single greatest predictor of a positive outcome in a student. In fact, twice as much impact as the next highest factor. In the clearest of terms: Students do far better when a persistent and passionate prayer partner joins efforts with a mentor.

The researcher, a secular expert on measuring mentoring's effectiveness, asked me to explain the prayer partner role because he had not seen such compelling data before. Today, when he consults with other mentoring organizations, he boldly recommends they add another role to their program—an "accountability partner." Calling it a "prayer partner" must be a bit too crazy for some.

Full disclosure: Our organization did not originate this idea. Possibly the most effective, yet unheralded prayer partner was Pearl Goode, a little old lady from Pasadena.

When the 1949 Billy Graham crusade came to Los Angeles, Pearl volunteered to work the event and felt compelled to appeal to heaven for the ministry team. "That night God laid those boys on my heart as a burden," she explained in a 1963 issue of Decision magazine, "and I have been praying for them ever since. I went to the Crusade every evening as long as it lasted, and began talking to God about them, asking him to anoint them individually and to give them boldness in proclaiming the Word."

Following the L.A. event, she began to pray for every crusade, traveling to cities across the country without attracting attention. On buses, starting in the 1950s. Just her. Very crazy. Very behind-the-scenes. Eventually, crusade organizers noticed that her name consistently appeared on volunteer lists. Arrangements were made for her to travel with the crusades so she could continue this critical role.

At Pearl's funeral service, Ruth Graham paid her very public tribute with these words: "Here lie the mortal remains of much of the secret of Bill's ministry."

But Pearl wasn't the first in this role either. Go back in time to a hill overlooking Rephidim, found in Exodus 17. The Israelites battle the Amalekites, and the Israelites prevail whenever Moses raises his hands. This is man-to-man combat, so Israel's success required individuals to do well. Eventually, this keep-your-hands-up-behind-the-scenes support becomes too much for him to continue and Israel suffers when his arms collapse; he needs a prayer partner or two. So Aaron and Hur stand beside him and prop up his arms.

That three-person team on a hill, Pearl's willingness to own a burden, and our army of prayer partners all share a common passion: to see God move.

Do you have a Pearl? Seems crazy if you don't.

### **UPDATE FROM PARISH COUNCIL**

At the Parish Council meeting on 18 September we:

- Spent time on pastoral matters and prayed for those needing support
- Spoke of the lead we had received from the Joseph family at the Whanau Service in August and the desirability of other families coming forward with items to share at these once a month services

This was a very well organised and challenging series with expert, knowledgeable speakers who provided information on the prison and justice systems and highlighted the need for change.
- Reflected on the high standard of entertainment arranged for the Luncheon Group Meetings which are held at 1200hrs on the third Thursday of the month. You don't have to be old to attend and all are encouraged to come along and bring your lunch. You will enjoy.
- Spent some time discussing the Survey which the Northern Presbytery is asking all churches to complete and decided to open it up to all our members.
   You should have received an invitation to complete the survey (either on line or a paper copy). Surveys are to be completed by 30 September
- Agreed to host the Coastal Region Representatives of Northern Presbytery for their 6 November meeting
- Agreed to Presbyterian Support Northern holding its AGM at our church on the afternoon of 29 November

# KAREL LORIER'S REFLECTIONS The Resurrection (2)

In last month's newsletter I wrote that the first mention of the resurrection of Jesus was in Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians. Paul was a Pharisee and Pharisees believed in resurrection. Although the Hebrews had not previously believed in resurrection or an afterlife, this changed, at least for some groups, during a time of persecution in the second century BCE.

In writing about the resurrection in his various letters Paul used three terms to speak of Jesus after the crucifixion: He was raised up; Standing up; Superexalted.

The first two of these terms were ordinary everyday Greek words, meaning to get up, like getting out of bed, or to stand up after resting. They are the same words which are used about the martyrs in Daniel and 2 Maccabees. Maccabees is not in our Bible but is used by Roman Catholics as they used the Greek translation of the Old Testament (included), whereas protestants used the original Hebrew texts (not included).

Paul speaks from his personal experience of the risen Christ. We all know the story of his Damascus experience when he travelled there to harass those who believed that Jesus was God's anointed (Messiah or Christ). Remember the story from Acts 9 when he fell off his horse when confronted by Jesus. (Except there is no horse in the story: this was an invention by later Christian artists which has continued over the centuries.) Acts was written at the end of the first or beginning of the second century by the author known as Luke, about 80 to 90 years after the event. A better version is Paul's own writing about his experience in Galatians, "When God decided to reveal his son to me, so that I might preach to Good News about him to the Gentiles, I did not go to anyone for advice, nor did I go to Jerusalem to see those who were apostles before me."

The risen Jesus appeared to Paul in the same way he had appeared to the other followers of the anointed Jesus. He writes in 1 Corinthians 15: 3, "For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our (because of our) sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, (Peter?) then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred people at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. Then he appeared to James, then

to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me." The Greek word translated "appeared" literally means "seen for," the implication being that it was God's action which provided the seeing or insight. This is important for Paul on two counts.

Firstly, seeing the risen Jesus, the anointed, the cursed one, who was hanged on a tree vindicated by God. (Galatians 3: 13) The evil power of the Roman empire, representing all human evil, had done its worst to him, but by showing that he was alive God had made known his approval of Jesus. Therefore, Jesus' life and teaching met with God's approval.

Secondly, he had the same experiences as the other apostles (envoys) by whom Jesus was also "seen for." They accepted him with the right hand of fellowship. (Galatians 2:9) This is why the crucified Jesus was of such importance to Paul, - crucified by Rome, vindicated by God. He was therefore able write about Jesus being "raised up" and "standing up," words for which we use resurrection.

The other way in which Paul speaks about the resurrection is that Jesus was super exalted, like the Roman emperors and other kings. The best example is in Philippians 2:6-11. There has been much debate about the form of this song or poem and where it originates from. Scholarship of the last 30 years suggested that it is a lampooning of an ecomium, a praise speech or inscription offered to the emperor who was considered divine, and here one was applied to Jesus. It was possibly composed by the Gentile followers of the anointed Jesus at Philippi, a Roman colony, and was quoted in Paul's letter with approval, although it does not completely accord with Paul's understanding and he has probably added the words "and death on a cross." You can look it up in your Bible as there is only room here to quote part of this praise speech. (Phil 2:9) "Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name which is above every other name that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father."

If the raised exalted Jesus is Lord, then the Roman Emperor is not. You will notice that there are no references to the empty tomb in Paul's letters. Those stories did not emerge until about 20 or more years later. I will write about that in a future article.
